Zion celebrated its 127th anniversary this year. There is a beautifully long, vibrant history at Zion. There is also an expected beautifully long, vibrant future for Zion. We are so pleased that God has led these good people to find their church home here with Zion. Many new members have immediately leapt into service within the church and are weekly worshippers. Hurray! Please know, whether you have been with Zion for decades or are a new face among us, you are valued and have an important role to play in the ministry we share with God.

Zion had an exciting year with our young people. 16 teens attended the ELCA National Youth Gathering in New Orleans, LA last summer. 4 junior high students traveled to Duluth, MN to attend a Serve Boldly mission trip, and 30 attended our Western ND LYO weekend in Bismarck. These experiences are very formative for the faith of our youth. We also continue to have a large weekly ministry with our teens and children. Including Church School offered 3 times a week, and a rich 4 year Confirmation program. Our Kids Sabbath worship times four times a year continue to be our largest worship attended services beyond Christmas and Easter. We are grateful for the many adults who volunteer their time supporting our program staff.

Zion continues to expand the many educational and fellowship opportunities provided. New opportunities this year included: OWLS (Older Wiser Lutherans), Yoga, Lutefisk Supper (returned), and Prayer Circle. A new Community Outreach team & Finance team also began this year. We are so grateful for the congregation's participation and leadership. Behind all that we do, your staff and Council anchors and organizes the ministry. When you have the opportunity please encourage and thank them, es-pecially new Office Manager, Amanda Babcock, Associate Pastor for Worship and Congregational Life, Natasha Kolles, Director of Education and Family Ministry, Chris Torgeson, Director of Youth and Family Ministry, Kortni Plorin, Custodian and Audio Visual Technician, Eric Burckhard. Eric just celebrated 10 years of work with Zion. We are so fortunate to have his talents among us.

2024 was a busy and productive year for Zion. Your church is alive, strengthened by each one of us bringing our best, showing up, sharing our time, wisdom, encouragement and resources. I join you in looking forward to 2025 and all the opportunities to grow with God together!

Family

Leadership

Leadership at Zion is marked by strength, creativity, and collaboration. Our teams and volunteers work tirelessly to envision and implement new ways to enhance worship, and service. For example, our Worship Team, meeting quarterly, brainstorms and refines creative worship ideas. This year, we explored multiple sermon series, introduced global music through our Global Band, and enriched our services with special music from choirs and handbells, led by Chris Torgeson.

Community Involvement

- Community Outreach Team: This newly formed team is discerning how best to engage with and serve our neighbors. As the team grows, we're exploring opportunities like hosting a block party, providing financial assistance to those in need, and dreaming up creative ways to embody Christ's love in our community. - Reconciling in Christ Team: This team continues its mission of fostering inclusivity and ensuring Zion is a welcoming church for all people, regardless of background or identity.
- Holy Listening Ministry: Meeting monthly during the program year, this ministry invites members of the broader community to share their joys, challenges, and insights. This year, we heard from Christy Miller, Executive Director of United Way, Scott Burligame on mental health, and Donna Bye, a parent of a special needs adult. As Donna Cole, a Zion member, shared, "Holy Listening has been such an eye-opener for me. It has taught me not to judge but to understand. You do not have to be perfect to be amazing."

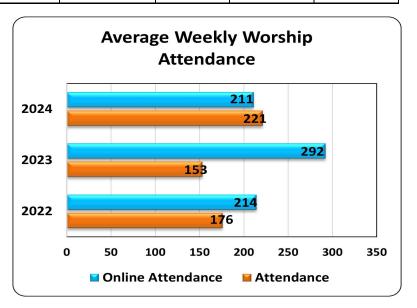

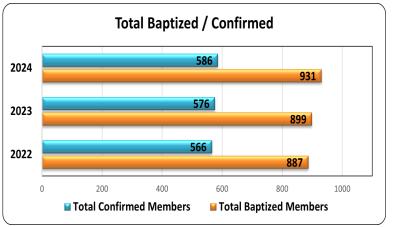

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TRUST COMMITTEE REPORT

The Zion Lutheran Church Trust Committee, consisting of members elected by the Congregation, is responsible for administering the permanently and temporarily restricted bequests, contributions, memorials, and gifts given to and for the benefit of Zion Lutheran Church.

Some highlights funded this year were:

Metigoshe Staff Scholarships Metigoshe Camperships MSU Lutheran Campus Ministries Pledge Metigoshe Ministries Pledge Day Camp Scholarships One Food Faith Family Meal 1/2 of the National Gathering Registration Scholarship Ad Spot on Reuseable Bags Grief Support Group Leader Guides

The permanently restricted funds are comprised of three separate funds which preserve their principal or corpus but may expend the distributable income, as defined by the fund documents.

- 1) The Lawrence and Hazel Snippen Trust is a donor created fund for the benefit of Zion Lutheran Church. Even though it's under the control of a separate Trustee, it is completely dedicated to the Zion Lutheran Church Trust, and is therefore included herein. John Huettl is the Trustee for this fund.
- 2) The Perpetual Fund accepts bequests, donations and memorials from benefactors and donors wishing to make contributions preserving the principal or corpus while allowing the earnings from those funds to provide support for Zion Lutheran Church's activities, missions, programs and needs at the discretion of the Trust Committee.
- 3) The ND Tax Credit Endowment Fund, established in 2014, accepts donations from donors wishing to claim the North Dakota Endowment Income Tax Credit for their contributions in accordance with the special rules, requirements and restrictions of North Dakota Law and the Fund.

The Perpetual and Tax Credit Funds transfer their distributable income quarterly into the temporarily restricted ELCA Income Fund (established in June 2017), which earns income as well. The Snippen Trust earnings are distributed quarterly into the Disbursement Account. Transfers are made from the Income Fund to the Disbursement Account as needed. The Trust Committee administers the distribution of those earnings in support of Zion Lutheran Church's activities, missions, programs and needs at its discretion per the Zion Trust Fund Bylaws. The activities in these Trust Funds are reported on the first following page.

The Memorial and Gift Funds may be restricted for use per donor specification and may be fully expended for those purposes. Church Pastors, Staff, and Committee Chairs direct the expenditure of these funds under the oversight of the Trust Committee. Those purposes are separately accounted for in individually sub-divided funds. The activities in these Memorial and Gift Funds are reported on the second following page.

The Trust Committee meets regularly and on special occasions to conduct the business of administering the funds under their control. There are fifteen committee members who are elected to serve three-year terms with a third of them being elected each year. Members may be elected to serve two consecutive three-year terms. After completing a second consecutive term, individuals must take a one-year hiatus before they can again serve on the comm<u>i</u>ttee.

Reconciling in Christ Committee Report

Zion Lutheran Church is proud to have a Reconciling in Christ (RIC) Committee that is committed to help Zion discern if becoming a RIC faith community is in Zion's future. Zion began actively exploring this idea in 2021. We have approximately 10 congregational members leading this exploration team.

RIC recognizes Lutheran churches and programs that welcome and provide a safe space for people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions. Zion's RIC Committee is working with the Church Council to help our congregation explore becoming an RIC partnered congregation. To become an RIC congregation, a Lutheran community must publicly indicate its welcome of all sexual orientations and gender identities. This can be done by passing a welcome statement at a congregational meeting. This will leave nothing unsaid. Our LGBTQIA+, Black, Brown, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC) siblings continue to experience exclusion and harm from others.

Some Christian communities who declare "All are welcome" will note that "All" does not include LGBTQIA+, Black, Brown, Indigenous, or People of Color (BIPOC). For this reason, it is valuable for congregations to explore becoming official RIC congregations. This would allow us to explicitly be identified as an inclusive and safe place for all. As a recognized RIC we would express our commitment to work towards becoming a full, welcoming, inclusive church who celebrates and advocates for all.

Engaging in this journey of discernment to become a RIC community deepens and expands the faith-life of Zion and builds lasting relationships. As we participate in dialogue to explore the RIC designation, we practice putting our faith into speech and action, creating a more vibrant spiritual community. Having a welcoming statement printed in our bulletin, in our announcements, read during worship and posted in our social media, serves to remind members who we are and how we have pledged to engage with one another while providing a safe, loving, accepting, inclusive environment truly for all. Our committee and the Church Council have work ahead of us to bring these discussions to you, our church members. We look forward to the upcoming year as we grow and learn as a congregation the direction and readiness Zion is at for these monumental steps. This will be a long journey, but I think you will find the lessons learned, the growth Zion will make and the faith journey we will all be able to experience will be beneficial for all.

relates to youth ministry would be easy then, right? Well, you would be sorely mistaken. As I try to perfectly articulate how impactful this scripture has been over the year, I'm at a cross roads. Do I talk about the line *"Created to be exactly as God made you to be"* from a song we learned while on our first ever Jr. High Mission trip to Duluth? Dive deeper on how God knew exactly what God was doing when each and everyone of us was created? Acknowledge that we are made in God's own imagine?

Or, I could take the route of describing how I watch the youth of Zion grow into who God created them to be. Some are created to be caretakers by carrying their brothers on their back when their feet where too sore to walk while in New Orleans. Some are created to make others laugh by writing JUMBO-TRON on their t-shirt in the hopes they would be on the big screen. Some are created to comfort others when they are having a panic attack because 17,000 people in one place can be a little nerve wrecking. Some are created to work along side their siblings in ensuring those experiencing houselessness have some sort of normalcies when shopping at a second hand store.

Another route I could take is to share how I feel like I was created to be part of Zion's ministry. From walking along side students in need of a shoulder to cry on, to creating space office space that is open for someone to work on homework. To watching a student's face shift as they realize what they are created to be, walking with them through that. I'm not sure which part will speak more to you, but just know, you, holy you, are created to be exactly how God made you.

Thank you Zion, for your continued support of youth ministry! From our 25 Confirmation Adult Leaders, to those who have supported our ministry financially during our wild fundraising season, and to those that prayed for us on our trips. Youth Ministry would not be possible without you!

Zion Outreach Committee Annual Report for 2024

Team Composition: The Outreach Committee is comprised of three dedicated Zion members, one council representative, and is supported by Pastor Natasha.

Mission Statement: The Outreach Committee is committed to serving our community with compassion and wisdom, adapting to changes and challenges as they arise.

2024 Activities and Assistance: This year, the Outreach Committee approved a total of ten assistance requests, extending help in various forms to those in need. Areas of support included:

- Lutheran Social Service of Minnesota
- Hotel stays (now discontinued except for informed exceptions)
- Utility bills
- Rent assistance
- Meals

Hotel Assistance Policy Update: Due to instances of abuse, assistance with hotel stays has been discontinued. However, exceptions can be made at the discretion of Pastor Natasha in collaboration with the committee members.

Gas Stamps: In 2024, we distributed gas stamps to 47 individuals. However, Marketplace Foods has recently discontinued paper gas stamps, transitioning to an app-based system. As of now, the committee has no replacement for the gas stamps, and we are actively exploring alternative options to continue supporting those in need.

These are just a few highlights of the past year, and we need to give a huge thank you to our very own Eric Burckhard as he has done much of the heavy lifting on all these items. The Committee has done a lot of great work over the last year, and they are very excited for the opportunity to continue to serve in the coming year.

Dear partners in ministry -

First and foremost, THANK YOU so much for all of the ways that you have supported Lutheran Campus Ministry this year! We are grateful for your kind words, prayers, financial gifts, hospitality, food and winter gear donations, serving soup, for serving as current and previous board membership, and for coming out to the Chili Cookoff & Auction. This ministry to the Minot State community is truly



one that comes to life through the body of Christ at work throughout our congregations. You all are amazing!

2024 has been a year of strengthening our established ministries and experimenting with ideas that could have an even greater impact in sharing the light and hope of Christ to students.

Our Food Pantry ministry continues to grow to serve the needs of students facing food insecurity. We have begun partnering with the POWER Center on campus, creating a secondary pantry location in the lower level of the Gordon B. Olson Library. Between the two locations we now average around 90 visits each month. We have also partnered with the Social Work Department so that we have up to two students each semester to help organize donations and keep the pantries well stocked for students. Both new partnerships have deepened our relationships within the campus community.

As an extension of the food pantry, the Cold Weather Gear Giveaway was well-used by many grateful students once again this fall. While there are many students at MSU from North Dakota and other colder climates, we also have quite a few from the southern states and Africa who are not prepared for the severity of our winters. Your gently used winter gear helps to give a warm welcome to these students.

We have also expanded our ability to serve soup on Tuesdays with the recent addition of a 9th roaster. We knew we needed to expand our operation when the line of students went out the door and we were out of soup an hour later! Tuesday Soup is also a great time for conversations with students and making connections. We are incredibly grateful for our volunteers – both the leaders of this ministry (we're looking at you Carmen Fricke, Dick Butts, Sue Robb, & Fred Rittel!) as well as all of those who have volunteered during your congregation's week to serve.

Christ-centered conversations are another foundational aspect of our ministry on campus in 2024. These happened both in small groups of students during times we've come together for service projects or Bible studies, as well as during one-on-one conversations.

One new way we were able to reach more students for chaplaincy this year was through our partnership with the POWER Center who created First Fridays. This monthly visit to the POWER Center enabled us to meet students we may not have otherwise connected with.

There were several other opportunities to build relationships this last year, including having a presence at the Western North Dakota Synod's LYO gathering as well as at a young adult retreat at Badlands Ministries, continuing our once-a-semester Church without the Church worship service at Prairie Sky Bread, hosting speaker and musician Rachel Kurtz to support Christians who have too often been pushed out of churches, and guiding yoga events in various churches.

It has been a fruitful year on campus, and we are looking forward to 2025 with eager anticipation as we continue to discern where God is calling us. Thank you again for everything you do to make this ministry happen!

AUDITING COMMITTEE REPORT

This year, an audit was not completed as a certified CPA goes through our financials monthly. The CPA ensures that all records are accurate and compliant with current regulations. This ongoing review process helps maintain transparency and accountability in our financial management. Additionally, it allows us to address any discrepancies in real time, avoiding the need for a full annual audit.

INSURANCE REPORT

Insurance Report- PRELIMINARY

As required by the By-Laws of Zion Lutheran Congregation, we submit the following Preliminary insurance information. The numbers below are all preliminary as church mutual will not be able to give us finalized numbers until this spring due to their new policy. 2026 will go back to the old policy.

Package coverage is written with Church Mutual Insurance Company of Merrill, Wi. The policy numbers are **TBD** (common Policy) and **TBD** (Umbrella Liability Policy). The policy terms are for 12 months and they will expire on the 1st if April 2026. Policies automatically renew at each anniversary with the policies premiums subject to adjustment at that time. The current preliminary premium total **\$15,058**

Church Members, officers and volunteer workers are covered for liability exposure. These policies do not apply to bodily injury or property damage arising out of or resulting from asbestos or lead in any form. The basic deductible on the main policy is \$5,000 for all perils except wind/hail which is 1% of the building limit and water damage which is \$10,000. The umbrella liability policy includes enhancements which offer additional coverage specially designed for Religious Institutions and carries a \$10,000 deductible. The package policy also includes a number of endorsements which offer specific limited coverage called property enhancements in various areas such as lock replacement and refrigerated foods.
